Who's someone you really admire?


My mom is the person I admire most. She was a single mom for a few years, and that really showed me how much she was willing to do for people she loved. She is my biggest source of support and encouragement.

Insurance Spring Renewal Reminders

In March • Clean out your garage: Check and lubricate the door's wheel mechanisms.

- Before things thaw too much, clean your gutters and check your attic for evidence of leaks or water seepage. In your basement, test your sump pump to ensure it is working effectively. Test the battery backup on your sump pump so that it runs during any spring storm power outage.
- II-March
 You may consider starting your flower and vegetable seeds indoors 1 2 months prior to the average final frost date of May II(ish). Mine get too leggy if I start them too early. Dark of the moon is March 13.
- **13-March** As you advance clocks for Daylight Saving Time, change your smoke and carbon monoxide detector batteries. Remember, these detectors do not last forever. If they are 7 10 years old, consider replacing the whole unit.
- **15-March** Multi-Peril Crop Insurance (MPCI) Sales Closing Date (SCD). We're seeing the highest commodity prices in six years. Have you determined your strategy and how to protect these positions? Contact Cherrie in Preston or Dan in Chatfield if you would like to wrap this up for 2021 crops. We represent Rain and Hail – an equal opportunity employer.
- In April Tune up your lawn mower with a new spark plug, air filter, oil change and if necessary, sharpen or replace the blades.
 - Inspect outdoor decks and porches. Replace any rotted wood. Tighten screws in any loose boards. Touch up any areas that need paint or stain. Clean and water seal.
- 2-April Consult your farmer's almanac for the best time to plant your root vegetables. Good Friday is traditionally the day because the moon phase is favorable. The waning quarter moon occurs on the 4th. (Easter). Did you know this moon phase also signifies gratitude? It is a time to reflect inward about how we feel.
- **I7-April** Trout Opener I'll let our resident trout fisherman, Matt Quanrud, expound on that.
- 29-April 2020 MPCI Production reporting deadline. Forget I told you this. Most, if not all, of my growers report their production when they harvest. That way, we have the most up-to-date Average Production History (APH) and premium estimates for the SCD. It is also Cherrie's birthday 🙂.
- In May Wash your windows inside and out. I almost always end up doing this Trout Days weekend.
 - Thoroughly clean your grill and check the [So] fuel level on gas grills.
- 28-May Plant those seedlings. If they aren't quite what you hoped, or died off during the hardening-off period as mine often do, go to Blossom Hill and get some great-looking, thick-stemmed tomatoes, peppers, zinnias and dahlias. That's what I've done the past several years and have never been disappointed. Also, I know some people get really anxious to plant those things on Mother's Day, but I just prefer to do it Memorial Day weekend less chance of frost. Although, as Joe Gosi once told me, "That's OK, we have more."

Investments Budget Checkup: Tax Time Is the Right Time

Every year, about 140 million households file their federal tax returns.¹ For many, the process involves digging through shoe boxes or manila folders full of receipts; gathering mortgage, retirement, and investment account statements; and relying on computer software to take advantage of every tax break the code permits.

It seems a shame not to make the most of all that effort.

Tax preparation may be the only time of year many households gather all their financial information in one place. That makes it a perfect time to take a critical look at how much money is coming in and where it's all going. In other words, this is a great time to give the household budget a checkup.

Six-Step Process

Budget Checkup

A thorough budget checkup involves six steps:

- Creating Some Categories. Start by dividing expenses into useful categories. Some possibilities: home, auto, food, household, debt, clothes, pets, entertainment, and charity. Don't forget savings and investments. It also may be helpful to create subcategories. Housing, for example, can be divided into mortgage, taxes, insurance, utilities, and maintenance.
- Following the Money. Go through all the receipts and statements gathered to prepare taxes and get a better understanding of where the money went last year. Track everything. Be as specific as possible, and [Where] don't forget to account for the cost of a latte on the way to the office each day.
- Projecting Expenses Forward. Knowing how much was spent per budget category can provide a useful template for projecting future expenses. Go through each category. Are expenses likely to rise in the coming year? If so, by how much? The results of this projection will form the basis of a budget for the coming year.
- Determining Expected Income. Add together all sources of income. Make sure to use net income.
- Doing the Math. It's time for the moment of truth. Subtract projected expenses from expected income. If expenses exceed income, it may be necessary to consider changes. Prioritize categories and look to reduce those with the lowest importance until the budget is balanced.
- Sticking to It. If it's not in the budget, don't spend it. If it's an emergency, make adjustments elsewhere.
