Matt's Trivia Corner

This edition's trivia is about a state that has one of the most diverse climates in the United States. You do know what state that is? I'll give you a hint. It starts with the letter M. You guessed it...Minnesota. And with that diversity, opportunities abound for young and old alike to enjoy the variety those four seasons offer. It has been said that the winters of Minnesota are long and sometimes even "unfit for human habitation." And some say there are only two seasons in Minnesota...Road Construction and Winter. Each season can bring some extreme weather as well and here are just a few examples.

Extreme temperatures from -60 below zero to 114 above have been recorded in Minnesota. And with the humidity factored in the highest heat index reading is 134 degrees. The largest temperature swing in one day was 71 degrees back in April of 1982. The temperature went from 78 degrees to 7 degrees in Redwood County after a cold front went through. Astronomical winter starts around December 21st and the Meteorological winter starts December 1st, but we all know too well the winter season can start much sooner!Two main types of storm systems bring the snow during winter. The Alberta clippers are fast moving storms with low snow totals and cold winds [Beautifies] and can bring the dreaded wind chill to much below zero. The Panhandle hooks which start from the south and "hook" around the Texas or Oklahoma panhandles can bring major snow falls and major blizzards, like the "Great Storm of 1975" which is known as the "Super Bowl Blizzard" or "Minnesota's Storm of the Century". Constant winds of 50 mph and gust to 90 created drifts 20 feet high in areas.

The anticipation of spring brings an end to that long winter season and cabin fever also comes to an end! During the spring season, which is a "major time of transition", the jet stream starts generally moving north and those living here in Southern Minnesota can experience severe storms, tornadoes and floods. Sometimes record snows also can fall during the spring months. In Northern MN, 50 inches fell in Duluth during April of 2013.

With the summer season coming, the spring winds have subsided and hot humid summer days and nights are now upon us. As the summer season heats up is when the humidity arrives along with possibilities of extreme strong storms. (Hmmm... doesn't seem that long ago we were complaining about the cold and long winter and now the talk is of the humidity and heat!) July is the hottest month and supposedly the only month in Minnesota without some trace of snow! I thought Minnesota

was supposed to have 4 seasons and not two! Severe droughts can occur, such as during the summer of 1976, 1988 and of course the Dust Bowl years in the 1930s. Another summer weather phenomenon are derechos (extreme straight-line winds), such as the derecho that befell Iowa this past summer. The most recent Minnesota Derecho was the Boundary Waters-Canadian Derecho which occurred on July 4, 1999 and blew millions of trees down.

Then the fall season arrives which is my favorite. The bright blue skies and the color of the hardwood trees paint a beautiful picture for us all to enjoy. In Southeastern MN with the bluffs and the hills, and the North shore along Highway 61 in NE Minnesota are favorite areas to observe those colors. What possible bad weather can occur in the fall? Well do you remember the Halloween storm of October 31, 1991? And of course, the famous Armistice Day Blizzard of 1940 occurred on November 11th.And this just in... Minnesota just set a record on October 20th for the largest earliest season snowstorm in 140 years of record keeping! That figures...it's the year 2020! So, what else is new?
